DMH, Waiver, Support Coordination and Guardianship Guide

- The Department of Mental Health (DMH) is an agency that will assist individuals with disabilities in accessing an array of supports based on ones need
- HCBS Waivers: Medicaid program that provides assistance to individuals to help them reside in and access their community instead of living in a nursing home or other similar setting.
- **Support Coordinator**: A person that helps identify supports an individual's needs, helps the individual plan for the life they want and connect the individual to services that will help achieve a quality life in the community
- Guardianship: Supporting an individual and/or putting representatives in place, in order to control their own life as much as possible should be attempted before pursing guardianship independently, a guardian may be appointed by a court.
